

The year is almost complete, and I am sure no one will be sorry to see this one go! It has been a tumultuous one to say the least.

It is disappointing to see the numbers of positive COVID tests skyrocketing (at least they were in mid-November.) It is troubling that friends and family members are falling ill. We wonder if, or more likely, when it will be our turn. Will we shut down again? Will schools and churches again be meeting strictly online?

When I found this picture it summed up how I am feeling. 2020 has been a difficult year physically, emotionally, and spiritually. The whole year has been "winter"—a few signs of life here and there, but mostly we are waiting for life to return; we are waiting for spring. Waiting for things to get better. Waiting for the pandemic to finally end. (And it will end as

all other pandemics have.) Waiting for a lot of things.

And there is light up ahead. The road is not closed; there is not a cliff to fall off of; there is a bend. We cannot see what is ahead, but the road has been maintained and is clear. There is hope ahead even though it is still twilight, even though it is still cold and everything is still and nothing is growing. This is also a peaceful picture and one of great promise about what lies ahead, at least for me. You might have a totally different idea about what it projects or would choose another photo altogether to sum up your feelings about this year and your waiting.

Yet in spite of the past crummy 9 months, we are in the business of hope. Not pie-in-the-sky-everything-is-coming-up-roses, but hope that knows that there is resurrection. We know that no matter how reality looks, there is something more ahead. Around that bend there is renewed life. No matter what, we belong to Christ, the Light of the world. Advent is a time of waiting and preparing for the birth and the return of the Savior. This waiting is not just sitting around watching the clock or calendar, but active waiting. Active waiting is *being* Christ in the world now. Being Christ in the world for those we love and those we do not know. Abundant life is here now even in the "winter" of pandemic and unrest because of the power of resurrection.

And now a shameless plug: If you are having trouble finding hope, if you are in need of a time of lament (venting anger and disappointment at God,) a time of rest, and an indication that there is indeed reason to hope, you are invited to worship on the "Longest Night" Monday, December 21 at 7:00 p.m. Pandemic willing, we will meet in person, but will also have live-streaming so that we can lament and heal together even if we are apart. As always, you can contact me as well and I can listen and lament with you.



## Why "Merry Christmas"?

The origin of the use of the seasonal salutation "Merry Christmas" can be traced back to at least 1565, when it appeared in *The Hereford Municipal Manuscript*.

"And thus I comytt you to God, who send you a mery Christmas & many."

An English admiral is known to have used the phrase in an informal letter in 1699, but the greeting grew in popularity after it appeared in Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* in 1843.

"A merry Christmas, Bob!" said Scrooge, with an earnestness that could not be mistaken, as he clapped him on the back.


"A merrier Christmas, Bob, my good fellow, than I have given you for many a year!"

Then, also in 1843, the inscription "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You" appeared prominently on the front of the very first commercially available Christmas card in England, commissioned by Sir Henry Cole with art by John Calcott Horsley.

The term "Merry Christmas" was coined during a time when many other "merry" phrases were in common use, e.g., "make merry," "merry England" and "the merry month of May." Over time the term "merry" shifted from meaning "pleasant, peaceful, blessed and agreeable" to the more frivolous definition of "jovial and outgoing." Apparently, Queen Elizabeth II did not like the change in tone and started wishing her subjects a "happy" Christmas in her annual Christmas broadcasts. To this day, the term "Happy Christmas" is used primarily by residents of Ireland and the United Kingdom.

According to Hallmark Cards, the most popular sentiment on a Christmas card remains to this day.

## Sommon What Do You Know?

- -about Christmas 2020-December 13 Children will lead the 9 am worship. "Twas the Night Before Christmas" is the title of the service and its message is that Jesus is the reason for the season. We plan to have practice the Sunday before, December 6th. We need all the children who want to participate to join in this annual gift to Jesus from the kids of the congregation.
- -about the Living Nativity-Children are invited and encouraged to be a part of the angels and shepherd bands. This will be December 12. Please sign up kids and parents for this remarkable family and community event. Live animals are scheduled too.
- -about Noisy Offering-During COVID season, the method of collecting the change is as follows: the cans are placed around the sanctuary and we will announce the recipients when we collect it. Noisy Offering in September went to the audio/visual upgrade for the church, October to the Colorado Fire victims and November to support local homeless shelters.
- -about December/Advent Sunday Classes The new Whirl Curriculum starts on November 29th. The Whirl Sunday School teachers continue to teach the Whirl lessons, as well as teaching about the church calendar year when we gather. Starting in October the Christian Ed team decided to include children in worship on certain Sundays so they can experience corporate worship with their elders. Including the children in the Worship service where Blaine, Atalia and Ryan shared their faith stories and affirmed their baptisms, was too important to have separate Sunday school classes. On November 22, Christ the King Sunday, the students remained in worship to learn about the liturgical year. Children need to feel a part of the larger church and our congregation is so good about welcoming and encouraging our kids to participate and lead in worship. Bobbie will mail kids' bulletins to families. As expected, the number of students attending in person Sunday school has been low so we appreciate that parents can share the lesson that is sent to the home.
- -about Catechism December 6 and 13 we will have virtual meetings, meeting times to be decided later. NO classes on December 20 or 27. Pastor Chris, Becky Romano, Ali Kelley, Lois Goodman and Dena Richter failitate the discussions about the Life of Jesus. Parents, thank you for making this Catechism time a priority for your son/daughter and for providing snacks.
- -about RTLC Camp-Sign up began November 1 for the summer of 2021 get your registration in ASAP. Please let Bobbie and/or Becky know if/when you have signed up so you also fill out a church scholarship form and we know the number of our kids seeking scholarships.
- -about December meetings-Christian Education will meet at 6pm on December 3rd. This may be a work session (preparing for the program).
